

Diploma in Permaculture Design: Education and Community Development

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This document is a presentation of my work towards a Diploma in Permaculture Education and Community Development from the Blue Mountains Permaculture Institute, under the mentorship of Rosemary Morrow. I made a public presentation of this work at a Permaculture Design Practicum in Barcelona, Spain, in July 2013, with Rosemary in attendance, and later revised & expanded it.

For my diploma fields in Education and Community Development, in this document I will concentrate on my work from July 2011 — November 2013.

I received my PDC certificate at an Occidental Arts and Ecology Center (California) course taught by Penny Livingstone and Brock Dolman in 1998.

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My Beginnings

In the spring of 2011, I was living in the French countryside, creating permaculture gardens, and working in forestry and natural building. It was my second year of experimenting with heavily mulched Hugelkultur beds, which proved to be a very effective technique in this cool, wet continental climate. The vegetables were growing significantly more rapidly and bigger in these beds than in neighbouring gardens, and they required much less irrigation.

I could see that there was something shifting in the world of permaculture. It seemed like a critical mass of some kind was being reached, or a foundational base had been achieved, and now there were many more projects, courses, and information sprouting up everywhere.

This inspired me, and I wanted to be a part of it. I decided that I wanted to move from being a permaculture practitioner to a teacher, organiser, and communicator...but I didn't know how to take the first step.

My Call To Action

Meanwhile, I could not but help notice, and be inspired by, the "Arab Spring" which started in Tahrir Square, the main square in Cairo, Egypt, and quickly spread throughout the Middle East.

Change was in the air, and as we would see, the year 2011 would stand out as a year of new ideas, inspiration, and rebellion against corrupt and inefficient regimes.

The Arab Spring inspired the 15-M movement in Spain (the "Indignados"). I had the good luck to be in Barcelona during this time when Plaça Catalunya was occupied by thousands of people. This movement in turned inspired the Occupy movement, which began in Wall Street and quickly spread to main squares in cities across the globe which were occupied for extended periods.



Rhizomatic Networked Structures in Nature and Social Movements

It reminded me of the the anti-globalisation movements of the 90s – such as the Zapatistas in Mexico and the protests against the global summits – who were characterised by a horizontal and rhizomatic structure. Rhizomatic roots have no beginning or end; any of their points can be connected to any other; they have many different entry points; they resist breaks and survive attacks; they are open, diverse, non-hierarchical and their nature is to connect. Its corresponding pattern in nature is the network.

I did my first PDC in 1998, just as this movement took off, and I was swept away by this inspiring, global, and effective wave against corporate control, social injustice, and ecological destruction. However, I didn't see how to connect permaculture with the movement.

When Events Conspire

In 2011, as I watched as this new movement quickly spread throughout Spain and the world, one day I had an idea whilst surrounded by approximately thousands of people on the streets of Barcelona: could a permaculture group or movement be structured with the same rhizomatic structure, the same network pattern?

And could it be an *urban* permaculture movement, as now for the first time in human history more than half of the population is living in towns and cities? It appeared to me that the social web of a city has a similar structure of an ecological web in nature. And if permaculture is going to be an effective response to global ecological and social crises, the development of urban permaculture is essential.

This idea of forming an urban permaculture movement the with the structure of the Indignados and Occupy movements became a dream which **inspired me to move back to Barcelona and start a group called, unsurprisingly,**Permacultura Barcelona. Here begins my work and my story.

Permacultura Barcelona

I started to talk to people and ask their advice on how to form this movement...dozens of people, and hundreds of conversations. Permaculture experts from different fields (agro-ecology, bioconstruction, facilitation, forestry, etc.) came together to form an initial development group. We worked hard on the question of how to create a rhizomatic structure that empowers people, but without creating a loose model characterised by inefficient and boring meetings. We held an inaugural presentation and party in June 2012, in which we collected the interests of over 100 people who wanted to be involved in the permaculture movement. Based on this information, we the adapted the model of David Holmgren's "Permaculture Flower" to our specific context and created seven commissions: Bioconstruction, Earth, Economy, Tools and Technology, Communications, Health and Well-Being, and Education and Culture, with a coordinator for each commission that would be part of a Circle of Coordination based on Sociocracy.



Summary of Permacultura Barcelona July 2011 - November 2013

In its first two years, Permacultura Barcelona (PBcn) developed an urban permaculture community through its social activities and hands-on projects. I had direct or indirect involvement in the following:

- Development stage: Summer 2011 Summer 2012
- "Bosques Comestibles" (Forest Gardens) project begins at Can Masdeu (CMD): March 2012
- First public event, attended by over 100 people: June 2012
- 1st "Asemblea" & creation of Commissions: Oct. 2012



Learning and Recommendations Diploma Process Debriefing and Learning

This follows the format of debriefing students after they have made a presentation in a Permaculture Teachers Training course, in which presenters are asked:

- what was the hardest thing,
- · the best thing, and
- · what they would do differently the next time
- The hardest thing about starting a new permaculture group in Barcelona was the cultural aspect. As a foreigner born in an anglo-saxon culture, I had to constantly second-guess myself and ask if the way I perceived reality was shared by people here, and whether I was acting in a manner that engaged people instead of pushing them away. For instance, time management is completely different in the Mediterranean from the Anglo-saxon or Germanic world. People are not nearly as concerned about time, and consequently meetings start late and go late, and if you try to push to make things work as they do elsewhere, it will backfire. Also, there is less emphasis on rigid, highly-organised structures. Things tend to either flow or not, but there is not the same sense of stress about time. As a teacher or event organiser, this can be frustrating, but ultimately it is not a permaculture approach to try to force a way of doing things that does not flow well.

Learning and Recommendations Continued 1

• The best thing was to see how through the use of social media, we created an urban permaculture community rapidly and effectively with hardly any organisational expenses. Social media in and of itself cannot generate a movement...the practical work of organising meetings, talks, films, courses, excursions, and most of all, hands-on activities, is essential.

When I first visited Barcelona in 2006 and mentioned a concept called "permaculture", the response I received from locals was often either disinterest (I may as well have been talking about reorganising my sock drawer) or even a slight discomfort (as if permaculture was just another strange anglo-saxonism with no relevance to life in the Mediterranean).

Nowadays when I mention it, eyes light up, necks swivel, and locals exhibit a genuine interest in finding out what exactly this intriguing word (albeit anglo-saxon) means. The striking difference in attitude over the intervening years has been influenced by the financial crisis, widespread political corruption, heightened attention to climate change, a generalised sense that fundamental changes in society are long overdue...and a substantial use of social media to publicise the activities of PBcn.

Community Development Learning and Recommendations Continued 2

A handful of people used permaculture design principles work to create a permaculture community in which anyone interested in learning, practising, and sharing permaculture in an urban context can now easily connect with others. In particular, the use of Facebook has been the most effective tool we have had. There is an online group called "Eventos/ Comunidad—Permacultura Barcelona" where anyone can share their events connected to permaculture, and an informational "fan page" and news site about permaculture called "Permacultura Barcelona" that has had several hundred thousand visits and been and "liked" by over 12,000 people from around the world—one of the most read permaculture Facebook pages in Spanish.

Learning and Recommendations Continued 3

· What I would do differently the next time

One of my objectives in the process of developing the urban group Permacultura Barcelona was to create an organisational structure congruent with the liberating approach to sharing knowledge I adopted from Rosemary's learner-centred teaching. And also, just as importantly, a structure that could be replicated in any city, in a manner horizontal and rapid, in the same way that the Occupy and Indignados movements had an open and horizontal structure which allowed it to spread quickly around the world. We decided to create the structure around the ideas of Sociocracy, in which each commission had a rotating coordinator who was present in a Circle of Coordination that organised the general activities and strategy of the group. The idea was that each commission could organise its own activities, and people could involve themselves in the commissions according to their interests, and the Circle would be working on the big picture but beholden to the commissions.

In practice, though the structure worked to create a permaculture community in Barcelona, there have been several problems:

Learning and Recommendations Continued 4

- One is that the different commissions gave a sense of dispersal, of people (most of all, of the different coordinators) splitting off into their commissions and activities, instead of engendering a sense of working together.
- Second, at least in this early stage of developing a permaculture community, there were too many activities happening relative to the number of people who wanted to participate, so some meetings and activities on the same day or night would be well-attended and others not.
- Third, though there is generally a lot of interest in practical activities, there is relatively little
 interest in the administrative and bureaucratic work involved in creating and maintaining a
 volunteer group and its communications, during an economic crisis, without financial
 compensation.

One result is that there has not been the interest we expected in the organisational work of the group. Originally, the plan was that each coordinator would rotate after six months. However, with a lack of new people wanting to do organisational work, the coordinators ended up rotating less than was planned because often there were not people to replace them.

Learning and Recommendations Continued 5

The glue that binds a group of permaculture people together is the practical work such as planting trees and gardens, building structures, doing dynamic activities...and eating and celebrating together. In fact, here in the Mediterranean the role of food in culture is so important that one of the best and most important things that we did as a group was to share dishes in a picnic after the work days at the Forest Garden and Communal Permaculture Garden at Can Masdeu, as well as the natural building and permablitz events.

What I would do differently if I were starting a similar group again, or what I would recommend to people doing the same in another city: follow Holmgren's principle of small and slow solutions. On one the hand, with all the energy and interest generated by the Indignados movement the crisis — which caused many people to look for solutions that have not been forthcoming from government or industry — I believed that trying to start with a relatively large and complex organisational structure was justified.

However, in retrospect, I think it would clearly have been more efficient to launch the group with a small circle of colleagues, focusing on having fun and building community and doing a few projects and doing them well, instead of experiencing a high stress and workload over the creation, maintenance, and evolution of a larger structure...in which case, the permaculture community would have surely started slower than it did, but it would have required less work to build and been more resilient and enjoyable.

Teaching, Courses, Talks & Conferences

Not only did events conspire to be in Barcelona at the start of the Indignados movement, but in June 2011 I had decided to become a permaculture teacher and was wondering about how to go about it. My friends John Jordan and Isabel Fremeaux came to visit my farm in France, and as we did a tour through the garden, I mentioned my decision. John stopped in his tracks, looked at me pointedly, and said, "You're kidding! Want to come teach the permaculture part of two upcoming Think Like A Forest courses?" I said of course, without hesitation.

I went back to my room and started looking online for permaculture teaching resources in order to get prepared. Almost immediately, a permaculture teachers training course with Rosemary Morrow came up for next month in Austria - and would end just before my first course started in Berlin.

The training gave me the tools and inspiration I needed, and just enough self-confidence, to devote myself completely to permaculture in the coming years.

• The hardest thing about teaching has been learning to acknowledge when I am not confident about a subject, and letting go of the need to feel as if I need to have all the right answers at my fingertips. This process of letting go started at the first permaculture teachers training course that I took with Rosemary. I came to the course with the idea that the way to be a good teacher was "chalk and talk": standing in front of the classroom and doling out information, pouring my wisdom into the empty vessels that are the students in front of me. That was the only model of education that I was really familiar with in a formal setting.

Over the course of six days, she slowly but surely dismantled this way of thinking. During the daily sessions of practicing different teaching methods, she would be there to give me specific challenges to help me let go of this burden, explaining that the collective wisdom of the group of participants is more than that of just the teacher; that the role of the teacher should be one of a facilitator, ensuring the flow of knowledge between the participants; that formal education as we know it is overrated and ineffective; and that a teacher doesn't need to know everything, and can and *should* say "I don't know, but I will research this and get back to you" when they don't know! Which leads me to...

Learning and Recommendations Continued 1

- The best thing about this learning process has been the letting go of the pressure of needing to always be the "Sage upon the stage"... has allowed me to relax when I'm facilitating a classroom experience, which allows for better teaching. In one teaching session, Rosemary instructed me to use any method aside from lecturing, which threw me into a state of panic. But by realising the wide range of teaching methods available to employ, I swallowed my panic and did the session using a combination of methods...and to my surprise, it went well! For the next session, she instructed me to only use questioning as a teaching method. And again, despite the fear which often precedes a paradigm shift, I found that it was refreshing and empowering to draw out the knowledge that the students already had, instead of feeding to them in a top-down approach. In learner-centred learning, the teacher participates in the learning process with the students, and by doing so becomes enriched, much more so than through chalk-and-talk or formal education models.
- What I would do differently if I were beginning again as a teacher...not wait until I was forty years old to begin teaching!

Conclusions

• Summary of the value of this work and its impact on my life

Before I had started the path I'm currently on, I had a fair amount of practical permaculture experience, a lot of activist experience, and very little teaching experience. When the antiglobalisation swept me off me feet right after I did my first PDC in 1998, I did not think about how to combine these various passions in my life. This time around when the Indignados/Occupy movement erupted, I fortunately saw an opportunity to weave them all together – integrating, not separating – which has opened up opportunities for me as both a teacher and an organiser.

Who I learned from

I owe a debt to people such as Rosemary and Starhawk who understand that ecological and social justice must go hand and hand...we cannot have one without the other. The increasing momentum in social and urban permaculture reflects this conclusion. Also, another significant influence on my work has been José Luis Escorihuela, a Barcelona-based facilitator. He encouraged me to consider the risks and problems associated with open social movements, which can easily be disrupted, and to organise more along the lines of affinity groups based on trust and efficient working relationships.

• The road ahead

The social movements born in Barcelona in 2011 have made a tremendous impact on the society, and there are opportunities to implement permaculture that didn't exist before. There are groups in the U.S. called "Perma Occupy" that are doing similar work to PBcn: making connections with social movements, becoming active in protests, and offering positive "solutionary" skills to the public that are necessary to make a paradigm shift towards a carbon neutral, ecologically vibrant, and socially just society.

Conclusions 2

To the best of my knowledge, the connections between social movements and a permaculture group, and the possibility of rapidly creating public awareness and a permaculture community, are special contributions that PBcn has made to permaculture on an international level.

• There is a direct connection between the science of ecology and horizontal networked structures that are becoming increasingly more prevalent in society, e.g. the Internet, Youtube (participative instead of passive like TV), the sharing economy (AirBnb instead of hotels), community car rental schemes, and social media such as Facebook. Of course, contradictions abound: Facebook and Airbnb are hugely profitable corporations that represent the system we are trying to change. However, permaculture videos on Youtube are an increasingly valuable resource. And after experimenting with email lists, open source social media, and two different website software platforms, we then turned to Facebook and found it to be the most effective communications and online organising tool by far...sadly, because most people are there and not on open source/ alternative sites...and because it works rather seamlessly and without fail compared to the constant software glitches and updates required by websites. Despite the corporation behind it, there is a reason why Facebook was one of the crucial tools used by activists in the Arab Spring.

Can Masdeu Forest Gardens (Barcelona, March 2012—Onwards)

Located in a former centuries-old leper colony in a natural park in the hills above Barcelona, Can Masdeu (CMD) <www.canmasdeu.net> is today one of the flagship agro-ecology and social projects in Spain. In the spring of 2012, the Barcelona city government created a contest for local associations to present their vision for how to connect the city to the park, and CMD asked me if I would like to be involved in the process and present a permaculture project as part of our proposal. I proposed to create a forest garden ("Bosque Comestible") in an unused slope, and before the contest was over, I initiated the project. We won the contest, but the city abandoned the process, a frustration but the problem is the solution: we had started to build a forest garden and what would become a multi-generational and engaging project.

I applied for and received a grant from Foundation Terre Humaine http://www.terrehumaine.org for the project, and began to organise other activities there such as weekly talks and workshops on Sundays.

Urban Community Garden, AureaSocial (Barcelona, Spain, Oct. 2012—March 2013)

In the fall of 2012 I began communicating with AureaSocial, an excellent example of a social and urban permaculture project, about the possibility of creating a rooftop permaculture garden. I participated in a dozen planning meetings and was active in the creation of this garden in collaboration with Permablitz.bcn. In September 2013, Rosemary and I did a talk on permaculture there.

Urban Garden, Edificio PAH (Barcelona, Fall/Winter 2013)

The PAH is one of the most popular social movements of modern history, with approximately 80% of the Spanish public in favor of their actions defending the right to have a roof over one's head. Rosemary was present for the first design meeting.




